Notice of Intent To Prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)/ Overseas Environmental Impact Statement (OEIS) for the Relocation of U.S. Marine Corps Forces to Guam, Enhancement of Infrastructure and Logistic Capabilities, Improvement of Pier/Waterfront Infrastructure for Transient U.S. Navy Nuclear Aircraft Carrier (CVN) at Naval Base Guam, and Placement of a U.S. Army Ballistic Missile Defense (BMD) Task Force in Guam

AGENCY: Department of the Navy, DoD. **ACTION:** Notice.

SUMMARY: Pursuant to section 102(2)(C) of the National Environmental Policy of 1969, as implemented by the Council on Environmental Quality Regulations (40 CFR Parts 1500-1508), and Executive Order 12114, the Department of the Navy (DON) announces its intent to prepare an EIS/OEIS to evaluate the potential environmental effects associated with relocating Command, Air, Ground, and Logistics units (which includes approximately 8,000 service members and 9,000 family members) from Okinawa, Japan to Guam. The EIS/ OEIS will examine potential impacts from activities associated with the Marine Corps units' relocation to include operations, training, and infrastructure changes.

DON also proposes to enhance the infrastructure, logistic capabilities, and improve pier/waterfront facilities to support transient CVN berthing at Naval Base Guam. The EIS/OEIS will examine potential impacts of the waterfront improvements associated with the proposed transient berthing.

Finally, the proposed action will evaluate placing a BMD task force (approximately 630 service members and 950 family members) in Guam. The EIS/OEIS will examine potential impacts from activities associated with the task force to include operations, training, and infrastructure changes.

The purpose and need of the proposed action is to fulfill U.S. government national security and alliance requirements in the Western Pacific Region. Guam's location as the westernmost part of the United States is critical to national security. The Department of Defense (DoD) national security strategy would increase the role of Guam and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands (CNMI) through the relocation of Marines to Guam, increased presence of a transient

CVN, and enhanced capability to defend critical military assets.

Mission critical, mission support, and community support infrastructure improvements are needed to ensure that Navy Region Marianas can provide expanded direct support of the DoD strategic mission and operational readiness in the Western Pacific Region. Infrastructure improvements would need to provide:

- Military training, subsequent garrison, operations, and infrastructure to support the U.S. Marines relocation to Guam.
- Port infrastructure for support to the transient presence of a CVN within Apra Harbor.
- Infrastructure to support the BMD task force, which can intercept missiles with potential to impact the critical military assets.

The EIS/OEIS will consider reasonable alternatives for siting operational, training, and support facilities on Guam, in addition to the no-action alternative. The DON Joint Guam Program Office (JGPO) will seek the input of the public on siting alternatives during the scoping meetings described below.

Seven Federal agencies will be invited to be cooperating agencies: National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration; National Marine Fisheries; U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; U.S. Department of Agriculture, Wildlife Services; Department of Transportation Federal Highway Administration; Federal Aviation Administration; and the National Park Service.

DATES AND ADDRESSES: Public scoping meetings will be held on Guam, Saipan, and Tinian to receive oral and/or written comments that should be addressed in the EIS/OEIS. The public scoping open houses will be held at the following dates, times, and locations:

- 1. Tuesday, April 3, 2007, 5 p.m.–8 p.m., location TBD (Guam, in central business area);
- 2. Wednesday, April 4, 2007, 5 p.m.– 8 p.m., location TBD (Saipan); and
- 3. Thursday, April 5, 2007, 5 p.m.–8 p.m., location TBD (Tinian).

Federal Agencies, Government of Guam agencies, Government of CNMI agencies, the public, and other interested parties are encouraged to provide oral and/or written comments to the DON to identify specific issues or topics for consideration in the EIS/OEIS. The DON will consider comments received in determining the scope of the EIS/OEIS.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The Office of the Secretary of Defense directed the DON to establish a JGPO to facilitate, manage, coordinate, and execute certain DoD actions in Guam. The proposed actions for consideration in the announced EIS/OEIS are under the cognizance of the JGPO, the DON action proponent.

Guam is host to the westernmost U.S. military installation on U.S. soil, and is located 2,400 kilometers (1,500 miles) from the Western Pacific Rim. The location of Guam allows for rapid deployment of military units to areas of possible conflict in the Western Pacific Region. The proposed action is required to maintain the DON's capability to accomplish its mission in this critical geographic region in support of the U.S./Japan Alliance and consistent with the DoD Integrated Global Positioning and Basing Strategy and Quadrennial Defense Review.

The proposed action would relocate an Air Combat Element, Command Element, Ground Combat Element, and Command Service Support Element of the U.S. Marines to Guam, provide enhanced CVN transient operational capability and logistics support at Guam Naval Base, and for defense, locate a U.S. Army BMD task force on Guam. The proposed action includes rehabilitation or construction of operational facilities, support facilities (such as housing), and training areas on Guam and other locations within the Mariana Islands.

The EIS/OEIS will analyze a range of alternative sites for facilities needed to support the proposed actions. Administrative, housing, training, and operations functions will be evaluated to determine a range of reasonable alternative locations within the Marianas. Reasonable alternatives, including, but not limited to, alternative configurations within Guam and the CNMI, will be considered to accommodate the operations, training, and infrastructure requirements associated with the proposed relocation of service and family members, the enhancement of CVN transient operational capabilities, and the siting of a U.S. Army BMD task force with its service and family members. The EIS/ OEIS also will analyze and consider the No Action alternative.

Impacts and issues to be addressed in the EIS/OEIS include, but are not limited to, the following resource areas: Coral and coral reefs, marine and terrestrial natural resources, including threatened and endangered species, water quality, noise, land use, airspace management, fishing, navigation, recreation, historical and cultural resources, utilities, and socioeconomics. The EIS/OEIS will include an evaluation of the project's direct, indirect, short-term, long-term, and cumulative impacts. No decision will be made to implement any alternative until the EIS/OEIS process is completed and a Record of Decision is signed by the Assistant Secretary of the Navy (Installations and Environment).

The JGPO is initiating the scoping process to identify community concerns and local issues to be addressed in the EIS/OEIS. Federal agencies, State agencies, local agencies, and interested persons are encouraged to provide oral and/or written comments identifying specific issues or topics of environmental concern that should be addressed in the EIS/OEIS. SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: ESG

COMPTUEX (May-June 2007) is a major Navy Atlantic Fleet training exercise proposed to occur in May and June 2007 in the offshore Virginia Capes, Cherry Point, and Charleston Operating Areas (OPAREAs) and adjacent military installations. The purpose of this exercise is to certify naval forces as combat-ready. Activities conducted during the exercise include air-to-ground bombing at land ranges, amphibious landings, mine warfare

exercises, gunnery exercises, small craft interdiction operations, maritime interdiction operations, and antisubmarine warfare, including use of mid-frequency active (MFA) sonar.

The FONSI is based on analysis contained in a Comprehensive Environmental Assessment (EA) addressing environmental impacts associated with land-based training for Major Atlantic Fleet Training Exercises on the East and Gulf Coasts of the U.S. The FONSH is based on analysis contained in a Comprehensive Overseas Environmental Assessment (OEA) and Supplement to the Comprehensive OEA (SOEA) for environmental impacts associated with Navy's conduct of major exercise training in offshore operating areas along the East and Gulf Coasts of the U.S. Environmental concerns addressed in the EA included land use, community facilities, coastal zone management, socioeconomics, cultural resources, airspace, air quality, noise, geology, soils, water resources, biological resources, munitions and hazardous materials management, and safety. The OEAs addressed potential impacts to the ocean physical environment, fish and Essential Fish Habitat: sea turtles and marine mammals; seabirds and migratory birds; endangered and threatened species; socioeconomics; and cultural resources. The SOEA included an updated analysis of MFA sonar use and gunnery use associated with ESG COMPTUEX (May-June 2007).

This action includes mitigation measures to reduce impacts to a level that is less than significant. Based on information gathered during preparation of the Major Atlantic Fleet Training Exercise EA and OEA and the SOEA and the evaluation of the nature, scope and intensity of the proposed action, the Navy finds that the conduct of the ESG COMPUTEX (May–June 2007) will not significantly impact or harm the environment and, therefore, an Environmental Impact Statement or Overseas Environmental Impact Statement is not required.

FSM panel discusses tax reform progress

PALIKIR, Pohnpei (FSM Division of Tax & Revenue) —

The Tax Reform Executive Steering Committee convened here to discuss progress of the tax reform work and consider a number of recommendations presented by the technical working group.

The ESC was established in December 2005 by presidential order following the Economic Policy Implementation Council and FSM congressional endorsement of the Tax Reform Task Force's recommendations on a package of nation-wide measures to improve the tax administration and the tax system in the FSM.

The ESC was mandated to oversee effective implementation of the tax reforms. The current members of ESC include Vice President Redley Killion, Kosrae Lt. Gov. William Tosie, Chuuk Gov. Wesley Simina, Yap Gov. Sebastian Anefal, Pohnpei Lt. Gov. Jack E. Yakana, and Larry Adams, representing the private sector.

The two-fold objective of the tax reform is to increase domestic revenue generation to compensate for declining compact sector grants and improve the tax system to create an environment conducive to private sector development.

The members of the tax reform technical working group provided a review of progress on the tax reform work. Some of the progress includes the initial drafting of key pieces of legislation,

the development of an economic model to estimate the revenue and price impact of the tax reforms, and the development of a high-level implementation plan for tax reform. This work has been developed with the technical assistance from the Pacific Financial and Technical Assistance Center and the International Monetary Fund. The meeting culminated in the adoption of a resolution which among other things endorses the high level implementation plan, requests the appointment of "implementation teams" in each of the states, and gives instructions to the working group on a number of steps necessary to accelerate implementation of the

At the conclusion of the meeting, members of the committee thanked Vice President Killion for his hard work and the important contributions he made to advance the tax reforms.

Global warming protests begin

NEW YORK (AP) — Americans worried about climate change gathered Saturday on ski slopes and in cities for a nationwide day of demonstrations aimed at drawing attention to global warming.

More than 1,300 events were organized in every state under the banner Step It Up 2007 to push Congress to require an 80 percent cut in carbon dioxide emissions by 2050.

"When it comes to global warming, I don't exactly think

President Bush is doing such a hot job," said 12-year-old New Yorker Tiffany Cordero. "A lot of people are thinking just of now. But we won't have a 'now' if we don't focus on the future."

Tiffany delivered a speech for arally in lower Manhattan's Battery Park, overlooking New York. Harbor, where people dressed in blue - some equipped with scuba gear and beach balls gathered to form a Sea of People human line to symbolically mark New York's future coastline.

Scientists say melting polarice caps and glaciers will cause ocean levels to rise, although estimates vary. The Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change has projected that ocean levels will rise 7 to 23 inches this century, but other scientists warn the sea level could rise 10 feet or more, enough to flood Lower Manhattan and other low-lying coastal

The threatened rise in the ocean also was dramatized by a New Coast Parade in Portland, Maine, one of more than 30 observances in that state. "The most impor-

tant things that we have a responsibility to do in government are to prepare our children for a bright future and to preserve and protect our natural resources," Maine Gov. John Baldacci told a gathering in Portland.

The nationwide events were spearheaded by a group of recent graduates from Vermont's Middlebury College, who organized a campaign of blogs, email messages and word of mouth communications.

"We see this to be the most pressing issue of our time, and our generation," said Will Bates, 23, one of six former Middlebury students who helped organize the event with author Bill McKibben, a scholar in residence at the college and among the first to write about global warming, in his 1989 book "The End of Nature."



The new license contains information to indicate if the holder is a minor.


Leon Guerrero said the computerized license will also serve



Students get lessons on traditional marine conservation

OVER 150 students from 10 elementary schools on Saipan learned about traditional marine conservation practices during a youth conference at the Hyatt Regency on Friday.

Sponsored and funded by the National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration's coral program, the conference became a big classroom for the students.

There were eight guest speakers including Dr. Teny Topalian, coral reef ecologist of the NOAA's Pacific Island Regional Office.

Noel B. Quitugua demonstrated traditional Chamorro fishing tools and implements as well as their uses.

Lorenzo L.G. Cabrera discussed the impact of development on Chamorro culture and marine environment while Gonzolo Santos talked about the importance of preserving traditional coastal medicinal plants.



Wanna bet on global warming? You can

NORFOLK, Va. (AP)—Think global warming will raise the oceans enough to submerge Cape Hatteras? Want to bet on it?

An online gambling service has started taking bets on global warming, including whether it can submerge some of the East Coast's top vacation spots.

The odds that Virginia's Cape Henry will be under water by 2015—200-to-1 at BetUs.com. Its odds for Cape Hatteras flooding by the same date—300-to-1.

Don't bet on it, says Phil Roehrs, a coastal engineer for the city of Virginia Beach. Roehrs

said although sea levels are rising along the East Coast, scientists are not predicting anywhere near the levels and dates provided by the gambling service.

"No wonder the odds are so good," Roehrs said. That hasn't stopped bettors from taking a chance. About 3,000 placed bets during the first three days on online booking, said Reed Richards, a spokesman for BetUs.com.

Most gamblers on the site have put down money that Manhattan will be submerged before New Year's Eve 2011.

"Don't ask me why," Richards said.

Cook recorded that they "were seized with an extraordinary weakness in all our limbs attended with a numbness or sensation like ... that ... caused by exposing one's hands or feet to a fire after having been pinched much by frost."

Ciguatera has long been known in the South Pacific, the Caribbean and warmer areas of the Indian Ocean. Some South Pacific islanders use dogs to test fish before they eat.

But in the past decade, it has spread through Asia, Europe and the United States, where more restaurants are serving reef fish, prized for their fresh taste and exotic cachet.

In the United States, ciguatera poisonings are most frequent in Florida, Texas and Hawaii, which has seen a fivefold increase since the 1970s to more than 250 a year.

Hong Kong, which imports much of its seafood, went from fewer than 10 cases annually in the 1980s to a few hundred now.

Still, Hong Kong diners pay a premium for the risky fish. Rare species like the Napoleon wrasse fetch nearly US\$100 (€77) a kilogram (2.2 pounds). The fish are increasingly shipped live from Southeast Asia and as far away as the South Pacific, raising concerns from the World Conservation Union that many species, especially groupers, could be fished out of existence.

Professor Yvonne Sadovy, of the University of Hong Kong, predicted that high demand and cash-hungry fishermen mean that "ciguatoxic fish entering markets around the world is going to increase."

Should global warming and pollution worsen and boost ciguatera poisonings, as most experts predict, health officials will face a daunting challenge.

Currently, there is no reliable way to detect whether a fish has ciguatera. The molecule is extremely complex and differs markedly from region to region.

There also is no antidote.

Furthermore, doctors are often ill-equipped to diagnose ciguatera, which has a range of symptoms and is sometimes misdiagnosed as chronic fatigue syndrome or other maladies.

Those challenges faced Dr. Edgar Portigo at Doctors General Hospital in Iloilo, about 430 kilometers (265 miles) southeast of Manila, when the Roa family and others arrived. The emergency room was filling with patients yelping in pain, vomiting, or, in the case of Dabby Roa, so paralyzed that he had to be carried in by a security guard.

"Normally, you have one or two emergency cases. Here we had 30 plus all at once," from ages 4 to 65, Portigo said.

At first, Portigo surmised the patients had heavy metal poisoning. But when he learned of the common thread—the barracuda dinners—he sent a sample of the fish to Manila for testing. It came back positive for ciguatera.

Portigo gave his patients intravenous drips and a diuretic to relieve their suffering. Most like Roa were released from the hospital in a week, he said, and fully recovered.

"Although this is quite rare, it can happen anytime," said Portigo, noting this was the first ciguatera outbreak in the city.

A relatively quick recovery is the norm, but some have lingering symptoms.

Dennis McGillicuddy, a 65year-old retired cable television company owner from Sarasota, Florida, fell sick a few hours after eating a mutton snapper he caught off the coast of Bermuda in 2000. Within hours, his vomiting and diarrhea were so severe that he became delirious and was "reduced to crawling," he recalled.

The digestive symptoms lasted two weeks. After that, McGillicuddy became so sensitive to temperature extremes that it was hard to take a shower. Numbness in his extremities lasted for almost a year.

"I've never had anything like this," said McGillicuddy, who still occasionally feels tingling in his left arm. "You feel terrible all over your body."

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration and others who monitor ciguatera say they are hampered by the lack of a reliable test. Bans on certain fish or "hot spots" can help, but they often are impractical.

"It's very hard to manage," said professor Richard Lewis, of the University of Queensland in Australia, who has studied ciguatera. "Unless you don't eat the fish, you have a risk of getting ciguatera."

Poorer countries often lack even rudimentary measures to protect consumers. Those precautions that do exist are undermined by government corruption or lack of enforcement.

Hong Kong has refused to enact mandatory measures to prevent ciguatera despite increased outbreaks. It argues that educating consumers and traders is the answer, rejecting calls to crack down on traders or ban fish from suspect areas.

"Given the fact we eat so much seafood in Hong Kong, this should be one of the priorities in protecting the population," Sadovy said. "I just hope we don't have to wait for someone to die before something is done."

In Iloilo, fear has done what the Philippine government has not. Consumers stopped buying barracuda after the ciguatera outbreak. Vendors have switched to less risky varieties. (Associated Press writer Dikky Sinn in Hong Kong contributed to this report.)

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

GPA may still get FAA discretionary funds

The Commonwealth Ports Authority may still receive discretionary funds from the Federal Aviation Administration this year if other Micronesian airports are unable to exhaust the available funds ranging from \$15 to \$20 million.

The CPA was earlier informed by the FAA not to compete with Palau and Federated State of Micronesia ports authorities for the 2007 discretionary funds because it would be the last year for them to be eligible for such a grant.

"If the other Micronesian airports don't use up the funding, by end of summer it would

ready with our application,' said Norita.

Norita has said that although FAA intends to prioritize aviation-related projects in other Micronesian airports, they would still be required to apply for it.

It means that if FAA does not see the projects a "priority," the CNMI would keep its annual discretionary funds.

"It's not really bad news for us," said Norita had said.

The CPA has benefited significantly from FAA's discretionary grants over the years at an average of \$5 million annually.

The discretionary funds are leftover entitlement funds that are up for grabs among insular areas every year.

Meantime, CPA said that FAA's position on discretionary fund use would not affect the CPA annual entitlement funds of about \$5.4 million a year.




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

Assistant U.S. Attorney Craig N. Moore stated in the complaint that on April 5 and 6, 2007, the defendant sold 6 grams of "ice" to a "cooperating source" in front of the Sister Remedio School in Chalan Kanoa District 2.

Judge Alex R. Munson set the preliminary examination hearing for April 26 at 10am.

Munson set no bail for the defendant and remanded him back into the custody of the U.S. Marshal.

A police detective stated in his report that on April 5, law enforcement personnel and a Department of Public Safety cooperating source conducted a controlled "drug buy-walk operation."

The detective said that at 7:05pm the cooperating source contacted Wei's cell phone and source and a DEA member placed an order of \$350 worth of three grams of "ice."

Wei told the cooperating source to meet him in front of Sister Remedio School.

A member of the Drug Enforcement Administration Task Force equipped the cooperating source with a recording device while another DEA Task Force member acted as an undercover agent.

At 7:14pm, both the cooperatmet Wei in front of the school at the western side of the parking lot.

The detective said the defendant turned over to the cooper-

ating source a rolled up piece of the same school at 1pm. toilet paper that contained two small plastic zip lock bags, each containing a crystalline-like substance.

Police said the substance tested positive for the presence of methamphetamine.

The following day, the detective said, the agents using the cooperating source again managed to purchase three more grams of "ice" worth \$350 from Wei at the southern portion of

DPS Special Investigation Section and DEA members then followed Wei after the deal.

The detective said a marked police car conducted a violator stop on the car that Wei was driving in Chalan Kanoa District 4 for failing to signal while switching lanes.

At 1:15pm Wei was arrested and searched. All of the drug buy money of \$350 was recovered, police said.

Vitnesses named for House ubpanel oversight hearing

he U.S. House Subcommittee on Insular Affairs sterday announced the witnesses for its overght hearing on the CNMI situation this week. Washington Rep. Pedro A. Tenorio will speak behalf of the Commonwealth.

David B. Cohen, the U.S. Department of the

Interior's deputy assistant secretary for insular affairs, and Jeanette Franzel, the U.S. Government Accountability Office's financial management and assurance director, will represent the federal government.

The hearing will focus in the "current economic, social and security conditions of the CNMI." It will be the first of two oversight hearings on the topic.

It will be held in Room 1324 Longworth House Office Building on Capitol Hill on Thursday, April 19, 2007, at 10am Washington, D.C. time. That will be 12 midnight, Friday on Saipan.

The hearing will be webcast live on the U.S.

House Natural Resources Committee's website at http://resourcescommittee.house.gov.

The Insular Affairs Subcommittee, led by U.S. Virgin Islands Delegate Donna M. Christensen, called the hearing to give House members an opportunity to familiarize themselves with CNMI issues.

In preparation for the hearing, the subcommittee sent three congressional staff members to Saipan on April 5, 2007, Thursday. The team, made up of Tony Babauta, Brian Modeste, and Rich Stanton, broke away for a day from a congressional delegation that was then visiting Guam.

The congressional staffers met with Gov. Be-

nigno R. Fitial, administration officials, lawmakers, and business leaders during their trip.

On Feb. 8, 2007, the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources also conducted a hearing on the CNMI. The hearing was held in light of proposals to extend federal wage and immigration laws to the Commonwealth.

Tenorio, Cohen, and Franzel were also witnesses at the Senate hearing. The witness panels also included Lt. Gov. Timothy P. Villagomez, Saipan Chamber of Commerce president Juan T. Guerrero, social worker Lauri Ogumoro, and former U.S. Covenant negotiator Haydn Williams.

Dollar's weakness hits new low

LONDON (AP)—The last time the British pound was worth more than \$2, the elder George Bush was waging a losing U.S. presidential campaign against Bill Clinton and the Eurotunnel linking Britain to Europe was still under construction.

It took almost 15 years for the pound to again touch \$2, the level it breached Tuesday after figures showing an unexpected surge in inflation led economists to conclude that multiple interest-rate increases were likely. The prospect of higher rates can boost a currency by promising bigger returns on certain investments denominated in it.

While the currency has been flirting with the \$2 level for several months, hitting it marks a

key psychological notch in trading that analysts expect to hold.

The pound reached a high of \$2.0074 before dropping back to \$2.0040 in afternoon European trading, up from \$1.9900 late Monday in New York. The last time the currency traded above \$2—on Sept. 16, 1992—marked the end of Britain's membership of the European Exchange Rate

"We believe that could well remain abo an extended period," s ard Archer, chief eco Global Insight.

Energy prices surged in March

WASHINGTON (AP)—Energy prices surged in March at the fastest pace since Hurricane Katrina, but other consumer costs eased, providing relief from worries that inflation was getting out of hand. The Consumer Price Index was up 0.6 percent last month, the biggest jump in 11 months, the Labor Department reported Tuesday. Prices had risen 0.4 percent in February. The March increase was driven by a 5.9 percent spike in energy costs, the largest gain in this area since September 2005, when Katrina shut down Gulf Coast refineries. Gasoline prices shot up 10.6 percent with another big increase expected in April given that pump prices have continued to rise. The nationwide average for regular hit \$2.88, the Energy Department reported this week, up 71 cents over the past 11 weeks.

Stocks up on inflation, housing data

NEW YORK (AP)—Wall Street traded mostly higher Tuesday, briefly pushing the Dow Jones industrials into record territory after a rise in home construction and a mild reading on consumer inflation encouraged investors to buy. The technology-dominated Nasdaq composite index and the Russell 2000 index of smaller companies slipped, showing that most of the stock market's gains were isolated in larger companies that are more impervious to economic stumbles. The Dow traded as high as 12,790.02, passing its closing high of 12,786.64 set Feb. 20, and approached its trading high of 12,795.93, reached the same day. The Dow rose 52.58, or 0.41 percent, to 12,773.04. Gains in Coca-Cola Co. and Johnson & Johnson, which reported earnings earlier in the day that exceeded expectations, gave the blue chip index its 13th rise out of the last 14 sessions.

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

What is an envir onmental impact statement?

An environmental impact statement, or EIS, is a detailed study of the potenti al consequences a feder al act ion mi ght have on people or the environment. An EIS informs decision-makers and the public of reasonable alter natives that would avoid or reduce impacts, or enhance the quality of the environment.

Why prepare an EIS?

Federal agencies ar e required to pr epare an EIS f or a ctions that may s ignificantly affect the human or nat ural e nvironment. This requirement is part of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).

The United S tates Congress passed NEP A in 1969 to ens ure that fe deral agencies consider environmental issues in planning and decision-making. The President's Council on Environmental Qual ity (CEQ) e stablished guideli nes for federal agency implementation of the act.

How is an EIS prepared?

Biologists, engineers, planners and other technical professionals examine existing conditions such as land use, socioeconomics, noise, air quality, water quality, traffic, vegetation and wildlife, and hazardous materials. Data are gathered and analyzed to identify how the proposed action might change current conditions. Issues most likely to be of concern to the public are identified and addressed.

The evaluation of i mpacts sometimes requires the use of methods such as computer modeling to determine potential changes (noise analysis is an example of wher e computer modeling plays a maj or analytical role). Where findings indicate that there might be significant i mpacts, the agency identi fies ways to r educe or minimize those impacts.

What is the process and how is the public involved?

The EIS process incl udes multiple steps, which are virtually all designed to encourage input from the public. Citizens, elected of ficials, special interest groups, and local, state, and federal agencies are encouraged to provide comments.

Agencies' public i nvolvement pr ograms for EISs should:

- Promote public understanding about the way environmental problems are studied and solved.
- Keep the public informed about the project and the EIS.
- Actively seek opinions and perceptions from concerned citizens

Formal public involvement begins a fter a **notice of intent (NOI)** to perform an EIS is published in the *Federal Register*. Additionally, a notice may be published in local newspapers. The NOI provides a noverview of the proposed project and initiates the process called "scoping."

Scoping is an early and ope n opportunity for public review of the intended project. During the scoping period, public input, both written and or al, is sought on significant is sues that the EIS should address.

After scoping, a **draft EIS (DEIS)** is prepared that considers all scoping comments received. After a **notice of availability (NOA)** is issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the DEIS is circulated for review and comment to government agencies, interested


private citizens, and lo cal or ganizations, and is made available for general review in public libraries and other public cly accessible locations. *Public hearings are held during this* 45-day public review period.

A final EIS (FEIS) is then prepared that incorporates, and formally responds to, all public comments received on the DEI S. This response can take the form of corrections of data inaccuracies, clarifications of and modifications to analytical approaches, inclusion of additional data or analyses, and modification of the proposed action or alternatives. The preferred alternative for implementation is identified in the FEIS, if it was not indicated in the DEIS.

The **record of d ecision (R OD)** follows the FEIS a fter a 30-day peri od. The ROD provides the public record of the agency's decision, describes the public involvement and agency decision-making process, and presents the commitments to efforts to reduce impacts. The proposed action can then be implemented.

What is the differ ence between an EIS and an OEIS?

An EIS is prepar ed under NEP A, which applies to federal actions within the United States. An over seas environmental impact statement (OEIS) is prepared under Executive Order (EO) 121 14, Environmental Effects Abroad of Major Federal Actions, which directs federal agencies to provide for informed decision making for major federal actions outside the U.S., including actions outside the U.S. territorial waters. The DOD has published procedures for implementing EO 12114 in 21 Code of Federal Regulations Part 187
